4. Manhattan Borough President's Report:

Kristen Ellis, a representative from the Manhattan Borough President's Office (MBPO) Scott Stringer, reported on his latest initiatives. Manhattan Borough President Stringer is seeking qualified, community-oriented individuals with an interest and background in education to serve on Community Education Councils (CEC). The MBPO is encouraging parents and community leaders to get involved in our children's education. 5. Elected Official's Reports:

Patrick Madigan, a representative from Senator Liz Krueger's office, reported on her latest initiatives.
The Senator is presenting "Legislation for the Common Good: Where Did it Go? Why You Should Care About Campaign Finance Reform!" at Lighthouse International, 111 East 59th Street, on Thursday, April 11, 2013, 6:30PM-8:30PM. For more information please call 212-490-9535. The fifth and last session of

Senator Krueger's Roundtable for Boomers & Seniors, "Making Connections as We Age", is being held on Thursday, March 21st, from 8:30AM-10:30AM, at the Lenox Hill Neighborhood House at 331 East 70th Street. Complimentary bagels and coffee will be served. To RSVP or get additional information, contact Rebekah Glushefski at <u>glushefski.nyc@gmail.com</u> or call 212-490-9535. He announced that incorrect information on tax abatements were sent to some co-op/condo owners. Albany passed a change in the law that only allows owners to claim the tax break on their primary residence, and no longer allows the break on secondary homes or for non-resident owners. The problem was that a number of people received the letter at their primary residence – which is indeed eligible for the full break. The Senator's office is working with the Department of Finance to get clarification and information about how owner-occupants can provide the necessary documentation to confirm their continued eligibility for this abatement.

- Justin Rush, a representative from NYS Senator Serrano's office, reported on his latest initiatives. Senator Serrano along with Assemblywoman Sandy Galef is calling for a revamp of the Member Item System in light of persistent abuse. Member items or legislative grants is money that is given to members of the NYS legislature through the state budget for local community organizations. They are urging their colleagues to pass their legislation, A641/S920, which would set very specific rules for how these funds are distributed and tracked. He also announced that Earth Hour will be recognized this coming Saturday, March 23rd, from 8:30PM-9:30PM when millions of people throughout the world will shut off their lights.
- Brice Peyre, a representative from Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney's office, reported on her latest initiatives. Representative Maloney hails the signing into law of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The reauthorization measure contains two provisions sponsored by the Congresswoman; the Sexual Assault Forensic Reporting Act (SAFER) will provide grants to conduct audits of unprocessed kits so that the backlog of hundreds of untested rape kits sitting in labs across the country can be tracked. The SAFER Act will help eliminate backlog and apprehend more rapists. The Campus Sexual Violence Elimination Act (Campus SaVE) requires institutions of higher education to develop and communicate their policies on dating, violence, sexual assault, stalking, and domestic violence and increases reporting requirements of these incidents which will help keep students safe. The Congresswoman along with other elected officials, Weill Cornell researchers, students and patients decry the harmful impact of the federal budget sequestration on medical research. The legislators are urging Congress to act before Friday, March 1st, the deadline to trigger sequestration, which will impose \$85 billion in automatic spending cuts on the federal budget, with a disproportionate share of the budget cuts being inflicted on federal funding for medical research supported by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and other federal agencies.
- Matthew Walsh, a representative from Assembly Member Dan Quart's office, spoke on his latest initiatives. He announced two pieces of legislation news that Assembly Member Quart has just voted on. The first piece of legislation is the increase in New York State's minimum wage from the current \$7.25 per hour to \$9.00 per hour. The second is a change to the NY SAFE Act which enacts the strongest gun regulations in the country. As an update to this legislation, there is a change on high-capacity magazines which will be limited to 10 rounds instead of 7 rounds.
- Emma Lowe, a representative from Council Member Daniel Garodnick's office, reported on his latest initiatives. She announced that an MTA worker was trapped in mud in the Second Avenue Subway construction tunnel last night. The worker was rescued by the NYC Fire Department and is expected to recover fully. The MTA has shut down work at the site pending an investigation. The City Council voted to pass a package of legislation to address New York City vendor laws. Council Member Garodnick stated, "These bills will help to ensure that fines get paid, that permit holders self-police the vendors working for them, and that the rules themselves are easier and fairer all around." The Council Member has written a letter to Metropolitan Transit Authority President, Thomas Prendergast, regarding the discontinuation of blinking blue lights on the Select Bus Service because the lights were not compliant as the law dictates that flashing blue lights are for emergency vehicles only. For many residents in the community, the blue lights served as a visual cue that a select bus was coming. He is asking the MTA to consider installing alternate distinctive lights to the Select Bus Service that are consistent with state law.
- Matt Bitz, a representative from Comptroller John Liu's office, reported on his latest initiatives. Comptroller John Liu's Bureau of Asset Management in February helped the New York City Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) become the largest fund in the nation to divest from the gun industry since the December shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School. TRS divested its holdings in publicly-traded commercial gun and ammunition manufacturers. The move followed a thorough review of the fund's exposure to such investments in light of recent gun-related tragedies. At the Comptroller's insistence, the five NYC pension funds voted to invest \$500 million in residential and commercial real estate, focused in areas affected by Superstorm Sandy. With leverage, it is anticipated that this will result in a \$1.5 billion capital infusion for potentially 3,000 units of housing and 150,000 to 200,000 square feet of commercial

- space. The \$1.5 billion rebuilding program will become the bricks and mortar neighborhoods need to rebuild in the wake of Sandy.
- Taina Prado, a representative from Council Member Jessica Lappin's office, reported on her latest initiatives. She announced that Council Member Lappin's news letter was available in the front.

Re: DOT School Safety Division to give a presentation on Safe Routes to Schools for three of our Priority Schools: Ramaz Lower School-125 East 85th Street, Park Avenue Christian Church Day School-1010 Park Avenue and St. Joseph's School-404 East 87th Street.

WHEREAS the New York City Department of Transportation's Safe Routes to Schools initiative is designed to increase safety within a 700-foot radius of local schools; and

WHEREAS having safer routes to and from schools aims to decrease injuries not just for students, but for the entire community; and

WHEREAS Phase 1 of NYC DOT's Safe Routes to Schools improved safety in the area around 135 schools; and WHEREAS Phase 2 of the program includes three priority schools within Community District 8: Ramaz Lower School, Park Ave. Christian Day School, and St. Joseph's School; and

WHEREAS potential street improvements under this project include several neckdowns and some concrete bus pads; and

WHEREAS neckdowns reduce crossing distances, increase pedestrian visibility, decrease sidewalk overcrowding, and calm traffic; and concrete bus pads prevent degrading asphalt;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Community Board 8M supports NYC DOT's Safe Routes to Schools program, and asks DOT to return in 2014 to present their final plans for the area around these three priority schools.

Community Board 8M <u>APPROVED</u> the resolution by a vote of 40 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause.

Re: Continued discussion-locations for Audible Pedestrian Crossing Signals.

WHEREAS Accessible Pedestrian Signals are specifically designed to adjust to ambient sound and to be audible only to a distance of 12 feet,

WHEREAS each corner has its own resonance and vibration that fluctuates both day and night, whereby this ambient sound adjustment prevents excess noise pollution,

WHEREAS eleven members of the public testified in support of Accessible Pedestrian Signals at the January 15 Community Board 8M Full Board meeting,

WHEREAS the United States Census Bureau estimates that more than 7% of residents of Community Board 8M have disabilities, and nearly 24% of residents 65 years of age and older have disabilities (*Source: NYC Dept. of City Planning, Dec. 2012*),

WHEREAS those community members with disabilities, including the visually impaired and those traveling by wheelchairs, deserve the same safety assurances and independence as all members of our community,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Community Board 8 Manhattan strongly requests that NYC DOT without delay install additional Accessible Pedestrian Signals on the Upper East Side, with the most current

technology, in consultation with constituent groups such as the PASS Coalition to choose locations for these signals; and that DOT report back to CB8M on the APS locations identified;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT Community Board 8M urges the New York City Council to increase the number of APS required to be installed annually from the current mandate of 25 per year (per Local Law 21 of 2012).

Community Board 8M <u>APPROVED</u> the resolution by a vote of 40 in favor, 0 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause.

• Parks Committee - Margaret Price and Barbara Rudder, Co-Chairs

Re: Request to Extend Hours that Dogs Can Be Off-Leash in Central Park

WHEREAS the limited 9 PM to 9 AM hours that dogs may be off-leash in Central Park poses a hardship for many dog owners who cannot use the park during those hours; and

WHEREAS areas available to off-leash dogs in Central Park have become more restricted over the last few years; and

WHEREAS Central Park is lacking in dog run facilities; and

WHEREAS there are areas of the park that are lightly visited and are lacking in the kind of sensitive plantings that could be harmed by dogs; and

WHEREAS many dog owners recently have received fines for minor infractions while their dogs were off leash; and

WHEREAS the dog owner community has expressed a desire to work with the Central Park Conservancy to resolve issues over off-leash rules for dogs in Central Park; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that Community Board 8, Manhattan, urges the Central Park Conservancy to meet with dog owners to discuss and resolve issues to make the Park more accommodating to this constituency.

Re: 815 Fifth Avenue (between 62nd and 63rd Streets) – Upper East Side Historic District – T.P. Greer Architects. Application is for a renovation and expansion that includes a reconstruction of the façade.

WHEREAS 815 Fifth Avenue was originally an Italianate style residence designed by Samuel A. Warner in 1870-71, altered by Murgatroyd & Ogden in 1923, with several later alterations over the past ninety years.

WHEREAS 815 Fifth Avenue is the oldest remaining building on Fifth Avenue between 59th Street and 110th Street.

WHEREAS 815 Fifth Avenue is the only remaining building designed by Samuel A. Warner in the Upper East Side Historic District

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to remove and reconstruct the front façade of the building and construct a 12-story apartment building (and rooftop structures).

WHEREAS 815 is on a highly visible block between two significant apartment houses and the scale of the proposed expansion does not maintain the character of the block.

WHEREAS the scale of the proposed building will out of context in the East Side Historic District.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this application is disapproved as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 29 in favor, 10 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

Re: 4 East 62nd Street (between Fifth and Madison Avenues) – Upper East Side Historic District – *Peter Wilcox*, *Architect*. Application is to legalize an existing sidewalk entrance canopy.

WHEREAS 4 East 62nd Street is a brownstone designed by Breen & Nason in 1879-80 and altered by Clinton & Russell, to reflect a neo-Italian Renaissance style, in 1898.

WHEREAS 4 East 62nd Street consists of 2 townhouses and an adjacent infill building that were converted to apartments in the early 1980s.

WHEREAS during the conversion construction the existing "grandfathered" canopy was removed.

WHEREAS a replacement canopy installed after the completion of construction (around 1983) was hit by a truck and was replaced.

WHEREAS the building received a violation for the canopy in 2008; the photograph at the Landmarks Commission shows the building without the canopy. (The photograph for the historic designation report was taken in 1983 during the conversion construction.)

WHEREAS the building has now decided to officially correct the violation.

WHEREAS the canopy was grandfathered at the time of the historic district designation.

WHEREAS the block has a number of canopies on both sides of the street.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this application is **approved** as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 40 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

Re: 112-114 East 73rd Street (Park and Lexington Avenues) [Buckley School] – Upper East Side Historic

District – *Ms. Jennifer Sage, Architect.* Application is to renovate the two houses, alter the exterior front elevation at the ground level, locate mechanical equipment on the roof and add a rear yard extension.

THIS APPLICATION IS DIVIDED INTO TWO PARTS: Part A – The work on the front elevation and the roof and Part B – The rear yard extension.

PART A – The work on the front elevation and the roof

WHEREAS 112-114 East 73rd Street consists of two Queen Anne and neo-Renaissance style row houses designed by Thom & Wilson and constructed in 1884-85.

WHEREAS the houses were originally part of a row of six houses.

WHEREAS at the front elevation at the ground level, the applicant proposes to unite the two buildings by creating a unified front with new doors and a ADA ramp and a common fence.

WHEREAS the front of 114 East 73rd Street at the ground level will be built out so that it matches the front of 112 East 73rd St. (i.e., 114 East 73rd Street is set further in from the lot line than 112 East 73rd Street – the two buildings will now be aligned. This would be within the areaway.)

WHEREAS at the front the two houses will continue to read as two houses, except for the work at the ground level.

WHEREAS new mechanical equipment will be installed at the roof, including a stair bulkhead, an elevator bulkhead and a skylight. The new mechanical equipment will add approximately 8-10' to the height of the now combined houses.

WHEREAS work on the roof will be invisible from the public way except for required work to raise up the chimneys on the adjacent building.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Part A of this application is **approved** as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 38 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

Part B – The rear yard extension

WHEREAS the applicant proposes an addition in the rear for classroom space.

WHEREAS the height of the proposed addition would be 13'9" and would extend to the lot line and be surrounded by/enclosed by a 36" parapet to be constructed of brick.

WHEREAS the proposed parapet would give the addition/extension a sense of enclosure.

WHEREAS the proposed extension into the rear yard diminishes the rear-yard space within the "donut" and presents too much bulk at a height of 13'9" plus the parapet.

WHEREAS the proposed rear yard extension is out of context and inappropriate within the historic district.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Part B of this application is **disapproved** as presented.

This recommendation failed by a vote of 15 in favor, 21 opposed, and 1 abstention.

A substitute motion to <u>approve</u> this application was presented before the Full Board. This substitute recommendation to approve Part B passed with a vote of 25 in favor, 14 opposed, and 1 abstention.

Re: 747 Madison Avenue aka 30-38 East 65th Street – Upper East Side Historic District - *Victor Zamparelli*, *Architect*. Application is to add new storefront infill.

WHEREAS 747 Madison Avenue is an apartment building designed by Kokkins and Lyras and constructed in 1959.

WHEREAS there is now one existing retail space at the ground level; the landlord is dividing the space in half and removing the apartment at the 2^{nd} floor so that that each retail space will now be two stories high – one half to be occupied by Alexander McQueen and the other space not yet leased.

WHEREAS the applicant (Alexander McQueen) proposes facing the new double height space in white and gray carrara marble and use an aged brass outer frame with a polished brass inner frame for the new enlarged double height windows.

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to remove the band coursing now at the height of the existing 2nd floor and proposes to add a new vertical element made of aged brass across the new front elevation approximately 3 or 4' up from the ground level.

WHEREAS the loss of the existing band course at the top of the second floor removes a existing strong architectural element from the front elevation; the band course that is characteristic of the building will be abruptly ended.

WHEREAS use of the white marble, even with the elements of gray within it, is just too bright and creates a jarring juxtaposition between the existing storefronts and the proposed new storefront.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this application is **disapproved** as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 35 in favor, 5 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

Re: 134-136 East 74th Street (between Park and Lexington Avenues) – Upper East Side Historic District – *Kramer Levin Naftalis & Frankel LLP* – A modern style residential building originally built in 187105 and redesigned by W. and W.F. Crockett, E.P. Mellon and W.L. Smith in 1928 and 1930. Application for ground floor and areaway alterations, a rooftop addition and alterations to the rear facade.

THIS APPLICATION IS DIVIDED INTO THREE PARTS: Part A – The alterations of the front and rear facades. Part B – the construction of a rooftop addition and mechanicals. Part C – the construction of a ground level 6' plus fence at the front elevation.

PART A - The removal of an existing storefront at the front elevation, the replacement of two existing entrance doors with a single entrance door to be located on the west side of the front elevation, restore the front façade above the first level, removal of the rear elevation extension at the first level and construct a chimney on the rear façade extending up to several feet above the roof, and replace the brick on the rear façade with new brick and new rear façade windows.

WHEREAS the application proposes to remove the storefront at the front facade and return the front elevation back to its original footprint, using the same limestone as that used above the ground floor.

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to install a new rear façade, removing existing tarred-over brick and existing damaged brick; and install new brickwork and new metal windows in historic style appropriate for the building, and install a new rear garden.

WHEREAS the design of the proposed rear façade is related to and no inconsistent with, that of the front façade. **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that Part A of this application is **approved** as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 38 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstentions, and 1 not voting for cause.

PART B - The construction of a rooftop addition and mechanicals approximately 16' in height at the highest point.

WHEREAS the proposed rooftop addition, including mechanicals, increases the height of the building from 52' to approximately 68'.

WHEREAS the rooftop addition and mechanicals create too much bulk on the existing combined building. **WHEREAS** the proposed rooftop addition is very visible from the public way and detracts from the character of the block.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Part B of this application is disapproved as presented. Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 37 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstention.

PART C - The installation of a fence in excess of 6' in height at the front elevation.

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to create a new areaway at the front of 134-136 East 74th Street.

WHEREAS the proposed new areaway would be surrounded by a wrought iron Fence, with a gate, that would run across the width of the property.

WHEREAS the proposed fence is approximately 6'.

WHEREAS the proposed fence height is out of scale for the building.

WHEREAS the proposed fence height is too high and out of context for the street.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Part C of this application is **disapproved** as presented.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 37 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstention.

1d. Cathedral of the Holy Trinity to close East 74th Street between First and Second Avenue on Saturday, May 4th from 11PM to 12:30AM for a Religious Ceremony.

Referred back to Board office; Religious Ceremony; OK for Board Office to Approve.

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to approve by a vote of 39 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

1e. St. Ignatius Loyola to close East 84th Street between Madison and Park Avenue on Friday, June 7^{th} from 5PM to 8PM for a Block Party.

Elementary school year end party in its 26th year. No changes to format which includes rides, arts & crafts, games. Open to the public. Tickets sold for rides.

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to approve by a vote of 39 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

1f. Brearley School to close East 83rd Street between East

Applicant did not appear or call

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to <u>disapprove</u> by a vote of 34 in favor, 5 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

1g. Accueil New York to close East 74^{th} Street between Madison and Fifth Avenue on Sunday, June 23^{rd} from 12Noon to 5PM for a Block Festival.

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to approve by a vote of 39 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

1j. Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints to close East 87th Street between Second and Third Avenue on Saturday, May 11, 2013 from 10AM to 4PM for a Block Party

Now in its 5th year, this event is a fund-raiser to send kids to camp. Tickets sold to rides, games etc.

Barbeque to be held on street with permits; steps are taken to inform and invite neighbors.

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to approve by a vote of 39 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

11. Lycee Francais De New York to close East 76th Street between York and Dead End Avenue on Saturday, May 18, 2013 from 10AM to 4PM for a Block Party

This event is in its 5th year on a cul de sac. All food is inside the building. Event is open to the public.

Manhattan Community Board 8 motion to approve by a vote of 39 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.
