4. Manhattan Borough President's Report

Jim Clynes announced the sad news that CB8M board member Lorance Hockert had passed away. Lorance Hockert was a lawyer's lawyer, from 1990 – 2003 he served as Chair of Bronx Community Board 8 and then as board member of Manhattan Community Board 8. He left a wife of 43 years and 2 sons. The memorial service will be held on Sunday, March 22nd, 11:00am, at the Yale Club, located at 50 Vanderbilt Avenue, Grand Central Station. There was a moment of silence observed in honor of Lorance Hockert.

6. Chair's Report – Jim Clynes

Chairman Jim Clynes made his report. Jim announced that there is a new Small Business Committee which is being chaired by Sarah Chu. Their first meeting is being held on Monday, March 30th, 6:30pm at Marymount Manhattan College, 221 East 71st Street in the Regina Peruggi Room. Nancy Ploeger from the Manhattan Chamber of Commerce will be presenting. The Health, Seniors & Social Services Committee will meet on Thursday, March 19th, 6:30pm at Lenox Hill Hospital, 130 East 77th Street, in the Michael Bruno Presentation Room. On April 8th, 6:30pm the Land Use meeting will be held at the Caedmon School, 416 East 80th Street and the Full Board meeting will be held at the New York Blood Center, 310 East 67th Street, in the Auditorium on April 15th, 6:30pm. The Executive Committee meeting will be held on April 20th, 6:30pm at Lenox Hill Hospital, 130 East 77th Street, in the Robert Carmel Conference Room. All executive officers and co-chairs must attend. The Full Board meeting in July will be held at Roosevelt Island.

7. District Manager's Report – Latha Thompson

District Manager Latha Thompson made her report. She asked that all co-chairs please send their agendas to the office as soon as possible. She asked the board members if anyone knows of meeting spaces in the community to please inform the office. During a recent District Service Cabinet meeting there was a discussion regarding Fresh Direct complaints and the Chapin School. Fresh Direct is working with the 19th Precinct to resolve these issues. Any inquiries regarding Street Life, Housing and the Small Business Committees should be directed to Latha. George Oliver is on an indefinite medical sick leave. She reminded all co-chairs about the District Needs Statements and the June and July Budget Consultations. She asked if board members have any issues please e-mail them to her and they will be discussed during the next District Service Cabinet meeting.

8. Committee Reports and Action Items:

a. Budget Committee-Barbara Chocky, Chair

1. CB8 Statement on the FY 16 Preliminary Capital and Expense Budget Requests.

Those present reviewed the agency responses to CB8's FY2016 priorities.

Capital Budget Priorities

- 1) Increase funding for permanent housing for homeless people.
- 2) Provide funding for a ramp at the Yorkville Branch Library.
- 3) Provide funding to repair, restore and design the entire Esplanade including the pilings on the lower level between 63rd and 96th Streets.
- 4) Fund repair of roof at 67th Street Library to protect recently restored millions spent on this branch
- 5) Provide funding for an elevator at the Yorkville Branch Library.
- 6) Provide funding for a new HVAC system at the Webster and Yorkville Branch Libraries
- 7) Upgrade fire alarm system at Webster and Yorkville Branch Libraries

- 8) Fund exterior rehabilitation of windows and replace where needed at Webster and Yorkville Branch Libraries
- 9) Fund the installation of pedestrian countdown timers at remaining intersections in our district
- 10) Increase funding for audible accessible crossings signals for intersections in our district
- 11) Request for kitchen renovation including an industrial dishwasher for Stanley Isaacs
- 12) Request curb cut throughout the district
- 13) Fund the installation of Big Bellies in our district
- 14) Fund the installation of newsracks for East 86th Street that meet NYC regulations
- 15) Fund the installation of newsracks for Second Avenue that meet NYC regulations
- 16) Provide funding for a new boiler/HVAC for the 67th Street Library
- 17) Install tree guards where missing from or when new trees go in and where needed extend the tree pit where needed
- 18) Fund the NYC Department of Sanitation for the placement of "rat-proof" garbage containers with lids in Community Board 8 preferably solar powered compactor baskets.

Continuing Support/Capital:

- CS Fund the expansion of the Roosevelt Island Branch of the New York City Public Library
- CS Provide funding for air conditioning in all homeless shelters
- CS Provide funding to construct additional public school seats to accommodate current and projected overcrowding
- CS Provide funding to repair or reconstruct the 81st Street Bridge over the FDR Drive
- CS Fund a Fully Built Park along the East River between 60th and 63rd Streets on the Esplanade

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted the Budget Committee's recommendation by a vote of 35 in favor, 1 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

Expense Budget Priorities

- 1) Fund Pre-K, Out of School Time and Daycare Programs for all children who go to school in Community District 8 or who have parents that work in Community Board 8.
- 2) Increase funding for youth programs in Community Board 8.
- 3) Increase funding for Rodent Extermination on city streets especially locations within the Second Avenue Subway construction area.
- 4) Preserve funding for year round workers at NYC Department of Parks and Recreation
- 5) Provide funding for exterminators of all parks within Community Board 8.
- 6) Increase funding for services to Older Adults, including Personal and Home Care; Transportation Services; Meals-On-Wheels; Senior Congregate Care Meal Programs and Case Managers.
- 7) Increase funding for additional Park Enforcement Personnel (PEP) maintenance staff, tree pruners and tree climbers.
- 8) Increase funding for Homeless Services Outreach personnel, especially during the overnight hours and provide the Department of Homeless Services with updated Information Technology equipment.
- 9) Provide funding to the NYC Department of Transportation for the necessary materials and personnel to repair potholes and repave avenues and major cross-town streets more frequently than every 10 years within Community Board 8.
- 10) Increase the number of workers to inspect, repair and preserve the Department of Transportation's infrastructure-(Bridges and Roads)
- 11) Provide additional Department of Buildings inspectors for signage compliance and code enforcement
- 12) Provide additional funding for Children's Services, especially programs to prevent abuse and neglect.
- 13) Provide funding to maintain current numbers of Traffic Control Agents
- 14) Provide funding for enforcement personnel in agencies dealing with general vendors
- 15) Provide additional funding for Eviction Prevention Services for At-Risk Senior Citizens.
- 16) Increase funding for the Department of Health enforcement of all Food Vendor rules and regulations.
- 17) Restore Sunday Service to one library in CB8 without cutting a weekday hours
- 18) Restore funding for all staffing of FDNY Fire Marshalls.
- 19) Increase recycling program including solid waste.
- 20) Increase funding for all NYCHA community and senior centers
- 21) Fund additional DCA inspectors for sidewalk café and compliance permits regulation enforcement.
- 22) Fund additional NYPD Police Officers

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted the Budget Committee's recommendation by a vote of 36 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstentions.

b.Transportation Committee-A. Scott Falk and Charles Warren, Co-Chairs

Re: A request to change the direction of the SBS off-boarding ticket dispensers from facing the street to facing the sidewalk

WHEREAS Select Bus Service (SBS) stations have MetroCard Fare Collector and Coin Fare Collector machines on the sidewalk, for riders to pay before boarding; and

WHEREAS the majority of SBS Fare Collector machines have been installed with the machines facing the curb; and

WHEREAS this orientation requires riders to stand in a limited area between the Fare Collector machines and the curb when paying for their tickets; and

WHEREAS riders who have obtained their tickets often stand in the same limited area until boarding the bus, causing crowding in front of these machines; and

WHEREAS installing the Fare Collector machines with their backs to the curb would allow riders to move behind the machines after purchasing their tickets, which would help alleviate the crowding in front of the machines; and

WHEREAS NYC Transit is planning to launch Select Bus Service on the M86 crosstown line in 2015; and

WHEREAS certain M15-SBS stations and Fare Collector machines may be relocated after completion of the Second Avenue Subway project in the coming years;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Community Board 8 Manhattan asks the NYC Department of Transportation and New York City Transit to install Select Bus Service fare-collection machines facing away from the curb at any new SBS stations within Community District 8 Manhattan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Community Board 8 Manhattan asks DOT and NYC Transit to consider whether those fare-collection machines that face the curb at existing SBS stations within Community District 8 Manhattan can be turned to face in the opposite direction (away from the curb).

Manhattan Community Board 8 passed the resolution by a vote of 35 in favor, 0 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause.

Re: Discussion of the possible elimination of the westbound M86 stop at 2^{nd} & York, which is proposed for consolidation with a stop on York Avenue between 90^{th} & 91^{st} Streets

WHEREAS NYC Transit is planning to launch Select Bus Service on the M86 crosstown line in 2015; and

WHEREAS NYC Transit proposes to move the first two westbound M86 stops, which are currently located on 92nd Street west of York Ave. and on York Ave. north of 90th Street, and combine them in a new stop on York Avenue between 91st & 92nd Street; and

WHEREAS this relocation would require some riders to unnecessarily cross 91st Street, across York Avenue from the future Marine Transfer Station (which is now under construction):

WHEREAS combining these two stops will create a quarter-mile gap between westbound M86 stations; and

WHEREAS combining these two stops will not result in an appreciable increase in travel speed for bus riders; and

WHEREAS the community wishes to retain the existing stop locations:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Community Board 8 Manhattan urges New York City Transit to retain the two existing westbound M86 stops on East 92nd Street west of York Ave. and on York Ave. north of East 90th Street, instead of moving and combining these stops.

Manhattan Community Board 8 passed the resolution by a vote of 33 in favor, 2 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause.

c. Landmarks Committee-David Liston and Jane Parshall, Co-Chairs

Re: 36 East 68th Street (Madison/Park) - Upper East Side Historic District - *Juan Matiz, Architect*-Neo-Grec style townhouse designed by R.W. Buckley and completed in 1879. Application is for work at the front elevation, rear elevation, roof, and courtyard.

WHEREAS the front façade of this brownstone building was modernized in 1932 by stripping the façade of its ornament and detail;

WHEREAS the front façade is currently finished with stucco;

WHEREAS the proposed front façade will be re-faced with limestone and the limestone on the first floor will be fluted;

WHEREAS the slate facing of the mansard roof at the façade, which is in poor condition, will be re-faced with copper;

WHEREAS the front entrance will be changed from a single door to a pair of doors and moved from the side to the center to create an overall symmetrical composition;

WHEREAS the front entrance doors and the fence at the front areaway are designed in an art deco style and the oval windows either side of the entrance doors are unresolved in their design;

WHEREAS the windows will have divided lites;

WHEREAS the decorative metal on the glass entrance doors, the metal of the fence, and the metal of the windows will be coated in a dark bronze color;

WHEREAS the angled roof will be lowered and made into a flat roof with a roof deck;

WHEREAS the new bulkhead stair and elevator bulkhead will be largely enclosed in glass and will be taller than the original bulkhead;

WHEREAS the new bulkhead will be invisible from the street because of the lower roof and the setback behind the parapet portion of the mansard roof:

WHEREAS the rooftop mechanical equipment will be located at the rear of the roof;

WHEREAS the brick façade of the rear of the house will be repaired;

WHEREAS the existing windows of varying sizes in the rear façade of the projected portion of the house will be replaced with windows of the same size centered in the facade on all habitable floors;

WHEREAS the curved metal and glass windows with metal fascias in the rear façade of the recessed portion of the house will be repaired;

WHEREAS the face of the angled slot opposite the curved windows will be faced with limestone;

THEREFORE be it resolved that this application is approved as presented inclusive of the limestone detailing over the front doors but exclusive of the first floor front façade and decorative metal fence.

Manhattan Community Board 8 adopted this recommendation by a vote of 29 in favor, 3 opposed, 3 abstentions, and 0 not voting for cause.
