




Northwell Health in New York City – Prior to 2010




NYC Resident Discharges (2017)








Lenox Hill Hospital: Over a Century and a Half of Innovation


1857	Community leaders recognized the need for medical services for the immigrant community and together found the German Dispensary		
1887	Four young German-American women form a Nurses' Training School class		
1907	First physical therapy department in the U.S		
1908	8 First tuberculosis division in New York City		
1938	938 First angiocardiography in the country performed		
1955	One of the first hospitals in the City to open a cardiac catheterization laboratory		
1957	One of the first intensive care units in New York City		
1967	First cardiac care unit in the New York metropolitan area		
1978	8 First angioplasty procedure in the U.S.		
1989	9 First Lyme Disease Center in New York City		
1991	First coronary stent in New York City		
2000	One of the first hospitals in the US to acquire a state of the art robotic cardiac system for minimally invasive heart bypass surgery		
2003	First FDA approved drug coated stent implanted		
2009	First totally endoscopic robotic coronary artery bypass on a beating heart

- 55,906 Emergency Room visits in 2018






History of Lenox Hill Hospital Growth

- No family space






Industry Standard Patient Room

- Patient confidentiality




Hospital Needs: Upgraded Operating Room Suites

Industry Standard OR Suite

(with circulation and support)

- Separation of restricted circulation
- Dedicated path for sterile supplies
- Rooms sized to support image-guided procedures and robotics
- Control rooms and dedicated space for IT equipment



Hospital Needs: Upgraded Emergency Department

- Individual patient rooms will enhance patient experience and infection control
- Private individual rooms for patients requiring a longer evaluation period
- Increase in patient treatment spaces to meet growing need for emergency medical services on the Upper East Side

Hospital Needs: Dedicated Mother-Baby Hospital

- Separate entrance, lobby, and dedicated elevators will provide a quick and private path for mothers in labor
- Enlarged single-patient post-partum care rooms will support 24-hour visitation and couplet care
- Private NICU rooms will enable families to be with their newborn throughout care





Lenox Hill Hospital Redevelopment: Project Overview

- State-of-the-art patient rooms, operating rooms, and emergency department
- New Mother-Baby Hospital with dedicated Park Avenue entrance
- Off-street ambulance bays and loading docks
- Atrium and other publicly-accessible space for engagement and education
- Subway station improvements
- Operational hospital throughout construction
- Portion of Park Avenue for new residential to support hospital redevelopment




Site Plan














77th Street (toward Park Avenue)










