8. Adoption of By-Laws Amendments

Item 1: New Elections Committee that will run the electoral process for Community Board 8's Election of Officers

Whereas Community Board 8 at its June 2022 Full Board meeting passed a resolution that called for the establishment of an Elections Committee to run the elections process for Board officers and

to change the process so that the Elections Committee will only preside over the elections and will not report out a slate of candidates,

Therefore the Bylaws of Community Board 8 are hereby amended to replace Sections II.D.1-2 with the following:

- 9. An Elections Committee will consist of five members elected by the Board at the September meeting. Members cannot run for Board office when they are serving on the Elections Committee and no member may serve on the Elections Committee for two consecutive elections.
- 9. Before the election of members of the Elections Committee, each member of the Board shall receive information about Board Members' length of service and any Committee positions, including prior service on the Nominating or Elections Committee.
- 9. Before the end of the September Board meeting, the chosen Elections Committee shall select one of five chosen Elections Committee members as Chair of the Committee.
- 9. By the end of a two week period after the September Board meeting, candidates shall send a message to the Board Office and the Chair of the Elections Committee stating an interest to run.
- 9. At the October Board meeting, the Chair of the Elections Committee shall report the names of all candidates for Board office. At that point additional candidates may be nominated from the floor, without the requirement of a second.
- 9. Prior to the date of the November Land Use meeting, board members may submit questions to the Elections Committee to be asked of Candidates for the Board offices. The Elections Committee will decide on the questions to put to the candidates for all Board offices and will ensure that the candidates for each office will be asked the same questions pertaining to the particular office.
- 9. At the meeting which takes place on the date of the November Land Use meeting, the Elections Committee shall put the questions that have been selected by the Committee to the candidates for all Board offices. The questions shall be the same for all candidates for each particular office.
- 9. At the November full Board meeting, the Chair of the Elections Committee shall run the election and allow each candidate for each office to speak for two minutes except the candidates for Chair shall have three minutes.
- 9. After all speeches are concluded, Board members shall vote for the candidates for each office in a separate roll call vote.

Section II.D.3 will now be Section II.D.10.

Item 2: <u>800 Park Avenue (Upper East Side Historic District)</u> - *Panorama Windows, Ltd.* - A neo Renaissance style building designed by Electus D. Litchfield & Pliny Rogers and constructed in 1925. Application is for window replacement.

WHEREAS 800 Park Avenue is neo Renaissance-style building designed by Electus D. Litchfield and Pliny Rogers and constructed in 1925;

WHEREAS the applicant proposes a window Master Plan for 800 Park Avenue;

transom top; the proposed windows removed the fixed transom top.]

WHEREAS the window master plan requires that all windows conform to the historic double hung windows — 8 over 8s and 6 over 6s — at the front elevation on Park Avenue as well as the side elevation on 74th Street — the applicant is to be commended for this;

WHEREAS there are 4 specific areas that present as deviating from the original historic windows: 1) at the second floor; 2) at the 3rd floor; 3) at the 15th floor; 4) at the rear courtyard;

WHEREAS at the 2nd floor, the historic windows presented as a pair casement with a fixed top transom with divided lights. — however, the proposed windows present as both 6 over 6 and 8 over 8 depending on width of each specific window;

WHEREAS at 3rd floor, the historic windows presented as double hung windows in both 4 over 4 and 8 over 8 configurations with a wider vertical central munition — however, the proposed windows present as a combination of double hung windows in both 6 over 6 and 8 over 8 depending on the width of each windows;

WHEREAS at the 15th floor, the historic windows are presumed to have been double hung windows with a simulated round top to mirror the limestone facade and the uneven sash in a 6 over 4 configuration; the existing windows now present as casement windows with fixed top transoms; the proposed windows will present as double hung windows with a simulated round top; [Note that both the presumed historic windows and the existing windows present as having a fixed

WHEREAS at the rear courtyard the historic windows are presumed to have been tri-partite outswing casement windows in a 2-wide 4-high grid configuration; the historic windows still exist on the 2nd and 9th floors as well as on the ground floor; windows on the 5th, 6th and 10th floors are the historic windows now with different patterns of leaded glazing; the proposed windows are tri-partite French casement windows in a 2-wide 4-high grid configuration;

WHEREAS the applicant's intent — in having the windows at the 2nd, 3rd and 15th floors deviate from the historic windows — is to have the windows on all floors - with the exception of the windows at the rear courtyard — match the historic windows so that the building's overall aesthetic is maintained [the 6 over 6 or 8 over 8 configuration];

WHEREAS in the proposed window master plan, the windows at the 15th floor will match the historic windows (without out the fixed transom);

WHEREAS at the courtyard, the proposed casement windows are similar to the original historic windows;

WHEREAS the windows at the 2nd and 3rd floors should also present in design as the original historic windows;

WHEREAS there is a subtlety to the original arrangement of the windows at the 2nd and third floors—and the way the windows differ there from the rest of the building's windows—that was intentional on the part of the architects and important to the texture and charm of the Park Avenue elevation and the 74th Street elevation within the historic district;

WHEREAS since the application is for a window master plan for the entire building, the windows at the 2nd and 3rd floors, could not be carved out and voted on in separate resolution;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this application is DISAPPROVED as presented.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 39 in favor, 1 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause

Item 4: <u>714 Madison Avenue (Upper East Side Historic District) - RAND Engineering and Architecture - An Italianate/ neo Grec style building designed by Gage Inslee and constructed in 1871. Application is for limited facade renovation.</u>

WHEREAS 714 Madison Avenue is an Italianate/neo Grec-style building designed by Gage Inslee and constructed in 1871;

WHEREAS is a 5-story commercial building that is currently the home of Buccellati, a high-end Italian jewelry establishment;

WHEREAS the applicant proposes the installation of exterior lighting, replacing the brass pin-mounted lettering on the front and sides of the entrance marquee and installing of fixed blue canvas awnings at the 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th floors -in addition to a general restoration of the front elevation.

THIS APPLICATION IS DIVIDED INTO TWO PARTS: Part 1 includes all proposed work with the exception of the proposed signage on the awnings at the 2nd and 3rd floors; PART 2 includes only the proposed signage on the awnings.

Part 1

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to install new exterior lighting at all the windows and new up-lighting at the cornice; the exterior fixtures will not be visible from the street;

WHEREAS the applicant also proposes to replace the brass lettering on the front and sides of the marquee; the lettering changes from 8" high at the front to 8 5/8" high and at the sides, the lettering will be slightly enlarged to 5 1/4 inches high; the signage will have halo-lit back lighting;

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to remove damaged glass panels and bottom trims at the existing storefront and replace with new glass and trim in kind;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that PART A of this application is APPROVED as presented

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved Part 1 of this resolution by a vote of 41 in favor, 1 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause

Community Board 8 Manhattan voted on the disapproval of Part 2 of the application, which failed to pass by a vote of 14 in favor, 27 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause. A substitute motion to approve Part 2 of the application was introduced

Part 2

WHEREAS the applicant proposes to install new navy-blue fixed awnings at the 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th floors;

WHEREAS the awnings at the 2nd and 3rd floors will have the name "Buccellati" on the skirt; THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Part B of this application is APPROVED as presented.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved Part 2 of this resolution by a vote of 32 in favor, 10 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause

Item 1: <u>630 Park Avenue (Upper East Side Historic District)</u> - *Yakov Weinstein* - A neo Renaissance style building designed by J.E.R. Carpenter and constructed in 1916. Application is for a one-story extension at the building rear.

WHEREAS 630 Park Avenue is an apartment house at the southwest corner of Park Avenue and 66th Street and contributes to the character of the Upper East Side Historic District;

WHEREAS the applicant wishes to enlarge the first floor in the rear to accommodate a larger Resident Manager's apartment;

WHEREAS the proposed addition will extend the floor ten feet into the rear yard of the building;

WHEREAS the proposed addition will be twenty-five feet wide, matching the width of the projection above;

WHEREAS the height of the proposed addition will be approximately eighteen feet above the existing utility courtyard;

WHEREAS the materials of the proposed addition will be consistent with those of the existing surrounding construction;

WHEREAS the proposed addition will be almost completely invisible from the public way on 66th Street and not at all visible from Park Avenue;

WHEREAS the Committee felt strongly that the proposed extension served a worthwhile purpose at the same time as it was of minimal intrusion to the historic fabric;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this application is APPROVED as presented.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 41 in favor, 0 opposed, 1 abstention and 0 not voting for cause

Item 3: <u>1088 Park Avenue (Park Avenue Historic District)</u> - *Mary Burnham, MBB Architects* - A Renaissance Revival style building designed by Mott B. Schmidt and constructed in 1924-1925. Application is for replacement of swinging doors, transom window, existing cornice, and lobby and exterior vestibule modification for increased accessibility.

WHEREAS 1088 Park Avenue is an apartment house at the southwest corner of Park Avenue and 89th Street and contributes to the character of the Park Avenue Historic District;

WHEREAS the applicant wishes to alter the Park Avenue entrance for purposes of Accessibility and transparency to the street;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration will replace an original revolving door and two swing side doors with a pair of central swing doors and fixed panels to either side;

WHEREAS the existing swing doors, at 2'-10" wide, do not accommodate a standard stretcher;

WHEREAS the existing revolving door set admits neither wheelchairs nor stretchers;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration solution is the substitution of a pair of 3'-0" doors at the center of the existing opening;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration will match in color and material the existing construction;

WHEREAS the existing floor where the revolving door is to be removed will be patched retaining the circular stone pattern;

WHEREAS the proposed swing doors and fixed sidelights will closely approximate the muntin pattern of the existing swing doors and existing fanlight to remain unchanged above;

WHEREAS the new doors will be built with applied muntins and a simulated spacer bar grid for the insulated glass units;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration will regrettably remove the revolving door, the resulting accessibility, both for wheelchairs and emergency personnel, justifies the nature of the alteration;

WHEREAS the project has been well thought-out and thoroughly documented;

THEREFOR, BE IT RESOLVED, that this application is APPROVED as presented.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 41 in favor, 1 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause

Item 5: <u>140 East 74th Street (Mary MBD)</u> - *O'Neil Langan Architects* - An Italianate style rowhouse designed by John G. Prague and constructed in 1871-75 with a front extension added after 1940. Application if for limited façade renovation.

WHEREAS 140 East 74th Street is a mixed-use building near the southwest corner of Lexington Avenue and 74th Street and contributes to the character of the Upper East Side Historic District;

WHEREAS the applicant wishes to alter the existing ground floor restaurant sidewalk extension and commercial canopy;

WHEREAS the existing extension is in poor repair;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration will not enlarge the existing building footprint;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration will include new windows and a new entry door, slightly taller than those existing;

WHEREAS the altered extension will be painted a uniform color in keeping with the balance of the building;

WHEREAS the altered extension will not have exterior lighting, nor will it retain the existing, somewhat dilapidated planters;

WHEREAS the windows of the altered extension will have an applied file on the interior to reduce glare to the street:

WHEREAS the new entrance canopy will be shallower in height and dark blue, with the restaurant name on the sides;

WHEREAS the proposed alteration creates a stylish box on 74th Street;

WHEREAS the new doors will be built with applied muntins and a simulated spacer bar grid for the insulated glass units;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this application is APPROVED as presented.

Item 1: Potential Upgrades of Painted Crosstown Bike Lanes to Protected Bike Lanes

WHEREAS; Community Board 8 prioritizes safety for everyone who travels within our community, including those on bikes, on foot, using public transportation and in cars and trucks; and

WHEREAS; biking has seen a large increase in popularity in recent years throughout New York City, including within Community District 8; and

WHEREAS; the presence of bike lanes provides benefits for those on foot and in cars, as interactions with cyclists are more predictable where bike lanes exist; and

WHEREAS; protected bike lanes provide significantly more safety for cyclists than the painted bike lanes; and

WHEREAS; Community Board 8 Manhattan has expressed past support for implementation of a network of crosstown bicycle routes using the safest appropriate design on the Upper East Side; and

WHEREAS; the current bike network within Community District 8 includes painted bike lanes on 70th, 71st, 77th, 78th, 90th and 91st Streets that provide a minimal level of protection to cyclists; and

WHEREAS; protected crosstown bike lanes are located on East 61st and 62nd Streets, but are very inconvenient to persons traveling east/west further north in Community District 8;

WHEREAS; there is a gap in crosstown bike lanes in the East 80s, forcing cyclists to bike without the benefit of a bike lane; and

WHEREAS; there is also a major gap in northbound/southbound bike lanes within Community District 8, as no bike lanes are present between Central Park and 2nd Avenue; and

WHEREAS; there are major gaps in the bike network within Central Park, impacting many cyclists wishing to travel directly between the East and West Sides; and

WHEREAS; as a result of the lack of direct and protected bike routes to and through Central Park, cycling on streets with minimal or no bike infrastructure and on the Central Park Transverses is dangerous and crashes are an all too common occurrence; and

WHEREAS; the deaths of cyclists Carling Mott on East 85th Street in July 2022 and Dr. Daniel Cammerman on the 96th Street Transverse in December 2019 may have been preventable had protected bike lanes been in place;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Community Board 8 Manhattan requests that NYCDOT provide fully protected crosstown bike lanes approximately every 10 blocks between 60th and 110th Streets (the whole length of Central Park) on both sides of the park, and a 2-way protected bikeway around Central Park, and present such plans to Community Board 8 as soon as possible.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 38 in favor, 3 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause

Item 2: Open Streets within Community District 8

WHEREAS; NYCDOT has granted approved applications to the Open Streets program from 11 schools in Community District 8 Manhattan, including on East 78th Street between Park Avenue and Lexington Avenue for Allen-Stevenson School; and

WHEREAS; there have been a series of complaints about misuse of the East 78th Street "Open Street" by Allen-Stevenson School for non-student purposes; and

WHEREAS; the "Open Street" on East 78th Street has interfered with the ability for patients and office staff to conveniently and safely access the many medical offices located on the block; and

WHEREAS; the "Open Street" on East 78th Street has generated noise and congestion complaints, with residents and businesses concerned that the open street will interfere with the ability for emergency response times to be swift; and

WHEREAS; no other schools operating "Open Streets" in Community District 8 have generated significant complaints; and

WHEREAS; NYCDOT has not sought Community Board 8 Manhattan approval for school "Open Street" applications, which it believes it should have been able to review; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Community Board 8 Manhattan requests that NYCDOT look into concerns raised by the residents and businesses on 78th Street, and work with the residents and the Allen Stevenson school to make changes to the open streets program that is currently in place;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Community Board 8 Manhattan requests that NYCDOT going forward should come to CB8 with all open street requests before they get approved.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 40 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstentions and 1 not voting for cause

Item 3: Revocable Consent to Construct, Maintain and use a Fenced in Areaway and Snowmelt System at 34-36 East 70th Street

WHEREAS; a revocable consent is requested by 34-36 East 70th Street to construct, maintain and use a fenced in areaway and snowmelt system; and

WHEREAS; 34-36 East 70th Street obtained prior approvals from CB8M's Landmarks Committee, LPC and DOB for renovation work on this property; and

WHEREAS; there will be a sunken areaway that will extend past the property line by 3'8", in line with the stoop and areaway of the neighboring buildings, which will result in 9'8" of public sidewalk remaining; and

WHEREAS; the sunken areaway will result in an areaway that in total is 7'7" deep, with a 15½ inch grade change between the sunken areaway and the public sidewalk and a 6-foot clearance from the balcony; and

WHEREAS; the fenced-in area will be aligned with neighboring stoops and areaways to provide continuity; and

WHEREAS; the applicant will commit to complying with energy code r400-309, and file an application with DOB as a standard application rather than as professional certification;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Community Board 8 Manhattan approves, as presented, the request by 34-36 East 70th Street for a revocable consent to construct, maintain and use a fenced in areaway and snowmelt system.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 21 in favor, 19 opposed, 0 abstentions and 0 not voting for cause

Item 4: <u>Application for a New Revocable Consent to Construct, Maintain and use a Snowmelt System at</u> 165 E 70th Street

WHEREAS; a revocable consent is requested by 165 East 70th Street to construct, maintain and use a snowmelt system; and

WHEREAS; the electric snowmelt system will be 492 square feet; and

WHEREAS; the applicant will commit to complying with energy code r400-309, and file an application with DOB as a standard application rather than as professional certification;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Community Board 8 Manhattan approves, as presented, the request by 165 East 70th Street for a revocable consent to construct, maintain and use a snowmelt system.

Community Board 8 Manhattan approved this resolution by a vote of 29 in favor, 9 opposed, 0 abstentions and 1 not voting for cause

Item 5: <u>Converting Former No Parking in front of the Church of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, located at 211 East 83rd Street, to Alternate Side parking</u>
