




The NYC Percent for Art Program

In 1982, Local Law 65, the Percent for Art Law was passed, which states that 1% of the capital funds appropriated for newly constructed or reconstructed City-owned buildings or sites must be allocated for works of art.

Percent for Art Eligibility Criteria

Commissions are installed in new or reconstructed City-owned buildings and structures, such as:

Dr. James Marion Sims Sculpture 5th Avenue and E 103rd Street, at Central Park 1934-2018







Dr. James Marion Sims (1813–1883), who has been referred to as the "father of modern gynecology". Sims has been the subject of much discussion, with some condemning the physician for his medical practices, and with others defending his record within the context of his time. Sims' medical advances were achieved through practice of surgical techniques on enslaved Black women, who were his principal subjects in the South where he initially practiced.

In January 2018, in response to sustained widespread criticism of Sims legacy as achieved by the exploitation of a vulnerable population, and now at odds with our contemporary values and ethics, a **Mayoral Advisory Commission on City Art, Monuments and Markers** recommended to:

Remove, Relocate, Replace

A representationalfigurative artist, Vinnie uses traditional bas-relief techniques as narratives to expand her storytelling. She has won numerous public-art commissions and awards around the United States, including Americans for the Arts inaugural José and Darlene Pérez Prize for civic engagement. VINNIE BAGWELL | Lead Artist

innie Bagwell preserves history by creating art for public places. She is a 2022-2023 inductee for the Who's Who in America for sculpture. A representational-figurative artist, Vinnie uses traditional bas-relief techniques as visual narratives to expand her storytelling. She has won numerous public-art commissions and awards around the United States, including Americans for the Arts inaugural José and Darlene Pérez Prize for civic engagement.

Born in Yonkers, New York, and raised in the Town of Greenburgh in Westchester County, Vinnie Bagwell is an alumna of Morgan State University. She co-authored a book titled "A Study of African- American Life in Yonkers From the Turn of the Century" with Harold A. Esannason in 1992. Many followed her compelling articles about the diversity of Yonkers' organizations, businesses, and cultural events in her weekly column for the Herald Statesman/Gannett Suburban Newspapers as well as her provocative news stories in the Harlem Times newspaper.

Vinnie Bagwell is an untutored artist, and began sculpting in 1993. Her first public artwork: "The First Lady of Jazz Ella Fitzgerald" was ommissioned by the City of Yonkers in 1996. The life-sized bronze is the first sculpture of a contemporary African-American woman to be commissioned by a municipality in the United States. In 2022, Vinnie Bagwell completed the 13-year creation of the "Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden"—an urban-heritage public-art project for the City of Yonkers to commemorate the first enslaved Africans to be manumitted/freed by law in the United States, 64 years before the Emancipation Proclamation. She is also the co-founder, vice president, and executive director of the Enslaved Africans' Rain Garden, Inc., a 501.c.3, non-profit arts organization.

Other accomplishments include: "Sojourner Truth" (at the Walkway Over the Hudson in Highland, NY) was commissioned by New York State Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation to mark the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution and the Women's Suffrage Movement. "Walter 'Doc' Hurley" (Hartford, CT), commissioned by the State of Connecticut, became the first public artwork of a contemporary African American in the State of Connecticut in 2019. Among other notable works, Vinnie created the piano (sculpture) for The Signature Theatre's on-Broadway 2012 production of August Wilson's award-winning play, "The Piano Lesson", directed by Ruben Santiago Hudson and "Liberté", a 24" bronze bust, commissioned for the Freedom Rides Museum's inaugural exhibition in Montgomery, AL, for the 50th anniversary of the Freedom Rides. The creative genius of Vinnie Bagwell's work gives voice to the ancestors' stories and meaning to their legacies.


















CONCEPT INSPIRATIONS


everal destinations within a five-minute walk of the installation site on Fifth Avenue at the intersection of 103rd Street in New York City influenced our concept for a public-art installation to celebrate the women who made modern gynecological practices possible, promote civic engagement, and foster racial reconciliation:

The Conservatory Garden is Central Park's six-acre formal garden. The Garden's main entrance is through the Vanderbilt Gate on Fifth Avenue between 104th and 105th Streets. This magnificent iron gate, made in Paris in 1894, originally stood before the Vanderbilt mansion at Fifth Avenue and 58th Street.

The Museum of the City of New York is located across the street. In the arts, "Victory" is often portrayed in classical sculpture as an angel. They right all the souls of humanity, and have inspired generations of artists. However, conventions for portraying angels were slow to develop and, once established, were slow to change. Thus, it is more than difficult to find examples of black people depicted as angels in the sculpting medium in public art.

The New York Academy of Medicine is directly across the street from the installation site. Its mission is to progress towards improved health through attaining health equity for healing. Thus, the impetus for our design was drawn from (1) the Rod of Asclepius, which is the symbol of the American Medical Association. (2) A quote from the King James Bible Numbers 21:8 "...And the Lord said unto Moses, "Make thee a fiery serpent, and set it upon a pole; and it shall come to pass that everyone that is bitten, when he look upon it, shall live." (3) The Hippocratic Oath is an oath to uphold specific ethical standards historically taken by physicians. It is often said that the exact phrase "First do no harm" (Latin: Primum non nocere) is a part of the original Hippocratic oath. It also mentions the special position of the doctor with regard to his patients, especially women and girls.







DESIGN CONCEPT

guide for souls will bear a golden flame in her right hand for she wields the power of enlightenment. She grasps a staff, crowned by the Arc of Asclepius encircled by a wreath, which represents the unending circle of life. The Beyond Sims public-art commission is simply titled, "Victory". Viewers minds shall be quickened and their spirits lifted by her presence.

Bas-relief techniques: A narrative in bas relief on the surface of Victory's garment shall add visual intrigue to capture the eye, and hold it, telling an epic story to provoke critical thinking: The shape of the continent of Africa cut away from her heart represents the Motherland's ruinous loss of more than 12-million people over hundreds of years.


As the viewer walks around the work, they will discover an unfolding story of endurance: Twelve women are silhouetted, representing the resilient nameless. Their clasped hands represents wish fulfillment, for without a measure of commitment, democracy dies in darkness. These soldiers of freedom set examples for risk-taking, which plays a role in releasing destiny's spark.


A slave-ship schematic "tattooed" on "Victory's" back shall remind the viewer of the inhumanity of transporting enslaved women like spoons in a draw. Braille reads, "My Soul looks back and wonders how I got over!" on her right side and "Primum non nocere!" (First do no harm) on the left.

"Betsy, Lucy, Anarcha, and countless millions of African women were imbruted, enslaved, and stripped of their human rights...": are the words emblazoned in the garment hem to remind viewers of the triumph of the generations who followed in their path. "Victory..." was designed to function among us as a pioneer for change.
